Shifting Ground: new political dividing lines? The interaction between leave/remain and Conservative/Labour supporters

Introduction

- This study tries to understand the relationship between how people voted in the EU Referendum and their support for the two main political parties.
- We look at the post EU Referendum wave of our long-term longitudinal study supported by Unbound Philanthropy (this wave was conducted Oct 2016), which explores a very wide range of issues facing Britain and social attitudes among a large sample
- We have divided the data into four groups: i) Conservative Leavers, ii) Conservative Remainers, iii) Labour Leavers and iv) Remainers

Overview: continuity and change... Three distinct groups of issues...

- Leavers and Remainers united: on nostalgia for past, anxiety about change, immigration, pressures on public services and jobs, scepticism of experts, faith in ordinary people and distrust in globalisation
- 2. <u>Conservative and Labour divided</u>: Labour more "left behind", affected by austerity, struggling financially, think life getting worse, believe economy rigged, want more income equality, while both Conservative Leave/Remain groups emphasise different rewards to reflect effort, most proud of our history and democracy
- 3. <u>Interaction issues</u>: gradient that runs from Conservative Leavers to Labour Remainers on support for collective provision of welfare, opposition to political correctness, support for gay marriage, opposition to death penalty

% Conservatives and Labour who voted in the referendum




1. On some attitudes leavers and remainers are united across the political divide

Leavers are more nostalgic for the past, feel a sense of alienation and an anxiety that things are changing too fast

Leavers more likely to agree things were better in the past...


To what extent to you agree or disagree...Things in Britain were better in the past





...and think that Britain is changing too fast...


To what extent to you agree or disagree...Britain today is changing too fast

To what extent do you agree or disagree...These days I feel like a stranger in my own country






Leavers are much more concerned about immigration than remainers; they are concerned about the pressures immigration puts on jobs and public services and feel that others get priority over them



when it comes to public services like housing, health and schools



Do you think the number of immigrants coming to Britain nowadays should be increased a lot, increased a little, remain the same as it is, reduced a little, or reduced a lot?






Leavers are sceptical of experts and more likely to have faith in ordinary people when it comes to complex decisions

opinions of experts and intellectuals






And have more trust in people's judgement on complex issues

even for complicated political issues






Leavers are far more negative about the influences of globalisation than remainers


2. But on some issues and attitudes, party lines are still strongly defined

affected by spending cuts


To what extent, if at all, have you and your family been affected by the spending cuts so far?




To what extent do you agree or disagree...it is increasingly hard for someone like me to get ahead in Britain





And are more pessimistic about life in Britain


To what extent do you agree that...for most people in Britain, life is getting worse rather than better


Labour and Conservative supporters have very different views on what type of society they want to live in.

should be small



reward differences in talents and efforts



for Tory supporters, it is Britain's history






3. But there are some issues where the picture is more of an interaction, with differences by party support AND whether people voted Leave or Remain – creates a clear gradient from Conservative Leavers to Labour Remainers

Labour voters think society should emphasise collective welfare - particularly

Labour Remainers, whereas Conservative Leavers favour individualism






Conservative leavers most likely to oppose political correctness – BUT

there is similarity among Conservative remainers and Labour leavers


How much does the following describe the REAL you...I am opposed to political correctness

How strongly do you agree or disagree...Homosexuals should be allowed to marry each other





most appropriate death sentence






Most Conservatives – esp Leavers, think politicians should speak their

regardless of what anyone lese thinks abut their views






And a real mix on issues that are the most important to the different groups...
