## One Year to Go – Federal Politics Update

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## METHODOLOGY



#### **Objectives and Methodology**

- These are findings of an Ipsos poll conducted on behalf of Global News.
- For this survey, a sample of 2,001 Canadians from the Ipsos I-Say panel was interviewed from October 5<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup>, 2018.
- Quotas and weighting were employed to ensure that the sample's composition reflects the overall population according to census information.
- The precision of online polls is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the results are accurate to within +/- 2.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what the results would have been had all Canadian adults been polled.
- Credibility intervals are wider among subsets of the population.

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




One year out from the election, the Liberals and the Conservatives are neck and neck in the popular vote among decided voters.





More than one in ten remain undecided on who they would vote for, while another one in ten say they would not vote or would spoil their ballot.

The Liberals do well among the young, men and the educated; Conservative support is strongest among Boomers and those in rural Canada.




Support is higher for the Tories among those who commute to work by car, while NDP support is higher among those who take public transit to work, and get most of their news from social media or the CBC. Liberal support is higher among immigrants, those who get their news primarily from the CBC, as well as those who take public transit to work.


Four in ten (46%) Canadians can't name Andrew Scheer as the leader of the Conservative Party of Canada.







Nearly half (49%) of Canadians are unable to correctly name Jagmeet Singh as the leader of the federal NDP of Canada.





Canadians are split in terms of their willingness to support a non-traditional federal political party. Half say they would be willing to do this (14% very willing), while the other half is less open to this possibility.

Millennials, gen X'ers and those from Atlantic Canada are significantly more willing to vote for a federal political party that isn't the Liberals, Conservatives, NDP or Bloc. 19% of NDP voters and 17% of Conservative voters are **very** willing to consider another party. Only 5% of Liberal voters say the same.



Canadians are split on whether they approve or disapprove of the Trudeau government. More strongly disapprove (26%) than strongly approve (10%).





About six in ten say that it is time for another federal party to take over, while fewer indicate that the Trudeau government has done a good job and deserves to be re-elected next year. But if this 42% shows up to support the Liberals, it would be enough for victory.



Fewer approve of their dealings with the immigration system or addressing housing affordability.




Conservative voters are most likely to say that the economy is a top issue of theirs, while they are the *least likely* to say that climate change/the environment is a priority.


Who is best to manage? Among those who name these issues as their most important, nobody has an advantage on healthcare, while the Conservatives have an advantage on taxes and the economy.











# GOVERNMENT AND LEADERSHIP



Eight in ten agree that the federal government has the ability to make an impact on their every day life by addressing issues of commute times, housing affordability and the cost of living. Yet, a similar proportion also agree that political leaders don't care about them, and that we need a strong leader to break the rules.



## **IMMIGRATION**



Two-thirds of Canadians believe that the country should reduce the number of immigrants allowed into Canada, while six in ten say there are too many immigrants already.

Concern about immigration is higher among Gen X and Boomers than Millennials. Conservative voters are by far the most likely to believe there are too many immigrants in Canada, and to believe that Canada should reduce the number of immigrants it allows each year.



## HOME OWNERSHIP



Canadians are concerned about the current housing situation, with two-thirds describing the current situation as a crisis. Further, 85% agree it is more difficult to buy a home now compared to 5 years ago, while 79% agree they are worried about the ability of future generations to purchase homes.



Women, British Columbians, Albertans, Ontarians, Conservative and NDP voters are significantly more likely to express concerns with the current housing situation, including that it is becoming more difficult to buy homes, and that they fear for future generations' ability to purchase homes.



## CRIME AND JUSTICE



Eight in ten Canadians agree that their country needs to toughen its laws on criminals, while two-thirds believe that the federal Liberals are too soft on crime. Fewer believe that the current government has found the right balance between punishment and rehabilitation.


