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Methodology

This 538/Ipsos Post-Debate Poll was conducted November 20th to 21st, 2019 using Ipsos' KnowledgePanel®. Wave 1 of this poll was based on a nationally-representative probability sample of adults age 18 or older. Wave 2, what this topline reports, was administered to those who indicated in Wave 1 that they are likely to vote in their state's upcoming Democratic primary or caucus (n=2,077) and went into field immediately after the November Democratic Primary Debate ended.

The survey was conducted using KnowledgePanel, the largest and most well-established online probability-based panel that is representative of the adult US population. Our recruitment process employs a scientifically developed addressed-based sampling methodology using the latest Delivery Sequence File of the USPS – a database with full coverage of all delivery points in the US. Households are randomly sampled and all persons in the selected households are invited to join and participate in the panel. Ipsos provides selected households that do not already have internet access with a tablet and internet connection at no cost to the panel member. Those who join the panel and who are selected to participate in a survey are sent a unique password-protected log-in used to complete surveys online. As a result of our recruitment and sampling methods, samples from KnowledgePanel cover all households regardless of their phone or internet status and findings can be reported with a margin of sampling error and projected to the general population.

Both waves of this study were conducted in English and Spanish. Wave 1, which began with a general population sample of adults, was weighted to demographic benchmarks from the 2019 March supplement of the U.S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey (CPS). This provided the appropriate demographic distributions for the subset of likely Democratic primary voters. Wave 2 weighting benchmarks for likely Democratic primary voters are from the final Wave 1 weighted data. Weighting adjusts for gender by age, race, education, Census region, metropolitan status, and household income. The weighting categories were as follows (for Wave 2, we included an additional adjustment for party identification):

- Gender (Male/Female) by Age (18–29, 30–44, 45–59, and 60+)
- Race/Hispanic Ethnicity (White/Non-Hispanic, Black/Non-Hispanic, Other or 2+ Races/Non-Hispanic, Hispanic)
- Education (Less than High School, High School graduate, Some College, Bachelor and beyond)
- Census Region (Northeast, Midwest, South, West)
- Metropolitan status (Metro, non-Metro)
- Household Income (Under \$25,000, \$25,000-\$49,999, \$50,000-\$74,999, \$75,000-\$99,999, \$100,000-\$149,999, \$150,000+)

The margin of sampling error among those likely to vote in the Democratic primary or caucus is plus or minus 2.3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level. The margin of sampling error takes into account the design effect, which was 1.14. The margin of sampling error is higher and varies for results based on sub-samples. In our reporting of the findings, percentage points are rounded off to the nearest whole number. As a result, percentages in a given table column may total slightly higher or lower than 100%. In questions that permit multiple responses, columns may total substantially more than 100%, depending on the number of different responses offered by each respondent.

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
