We're very wrong on many climate change and environmental facts...

A new study conducted by Ipsos among the general public in the US on misperceptions of climate change and environmental issues shows how much we get wrong about the challenges facing our planet...

- We underestimate how record-breaking global temperatures now are: we guess 14 of the last 22 years are among the hottest 20 on record since 1850 when *all 20 hottest years* have been in the last 22 years. Only 15% of the public correctly guess that it's all 20, including only 9% of Republicans.
- We overestimate how much plastic waste has been recycled: we think 54% of plastic waste is still in the environment when it's actually 79%; and we think that 26% has been recycled when it's only 9%.
- We overestimate the impact of air travel on global greenhouse gases: we think air travel contributes 16% of global greenhouse gases when it's 2%.
- BUT we don't realise how much skipping just one transatlantic flight would save in greenhouse gases, only 10% correctly pick it out in the top 3 of actions individuals can take.
- Only a quarter of people correctly guess that animal populations have declined by 60% since 1970, including only 16% of Republicans.

...many of us agree there is a serious climate threat – but there are big differences between Republicans and Democrats

But our attitudes show most of us recognise the seriousness of the threat to the global climate, even if views are often divided along party lines:

- Most Americans **reject Donald Trump's past assertion that global warming is an expensive hoax** (60% disagree), although one in five do agree (22%).
- And most of us **agree that we're facing a climate change emergency** (62% agree), although again 20% do not agree.
- But there are very large differences in views between Republicans and Democrats: 70% of Democrats strongly disagree that global warming is an expensive hoax, compared with only 17% of Republicans.
- And 48% of Republicans disagree that we're facing a climate change emergency, compared with only 6% of Democrats.

We underestimate just how unusual global temperatures have become...

We asked people how many of the hottest 20 years on record have been in last 22 years, based on World Meteorological Organization estimates that go back to 1850...

On average we guess that <u>14 of the 20</u> hottest years on record were in the last 22 years

... while actual data shows that <u>all 20</u> of the hottest years on record have been in the last 22 years

Only 15% of the US public correctly guess 20...




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...and only 9% of Republicans correctly guess 20, compared with 23% of Democrats

We underestimate how much plastic waste is still in the environment


We asked people, of the 6.3 billion tonnes of plastic waste that have been created globally, what percentages have been recycled, incinerated or are in the environment in landfill or as litter...

... and we are very wrong about the source of greenhouse gas emissions

We asked people what percentage of total greenhouse gas emissions around the world they thought a range of sectors contributed in 2014... and we hugely underestimate electricity and heat production, and overestimate air travel

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We are also very wrong on how much impact different actions have on greenhouse gas emissions. We particularly overestimate the impact of recycling and underestimate the impact of flying, and of having children

Democrats and Republicans are equally wrong on the most CO2 saving actions: only 9% of each pick transatlantic flights, and 49% of each (wrongly) pick recycling

* This is calculated by quantifying future emissions of descendants based on historical rates, based on heredity

Only 24% of the public correctly think that the population sizes of mammals, birds, fish and reptiles in the world has fallen by 60% since 1970, which is the WWF estimate – although only 11% think populations have stayed about the same

Only 16% of Republicans correctly guess 60%, compared with 29% of Democrats

Despite our misperceptions, our attitudes show most do think we're facing a climate change emergency...

.... but there are big differences between Republicans and Democrats

22% of Americans agree with Donald Trump's statement that 'global warming is an expensive hoax' – while 60% disagree, including 45% who strongly disagree.


In contrast, 62% agree that we're facing a climate change emergency, with 20% disagreeing

Republicans (40%) are almost four times as likely as Democrats (11%) to agree that global warming is an expensive hoax, while Democrats (70%) are more than four times as likely as Republicans (17%) to strongly disagree with this statement


To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements? Global warming is an expensive hoax





Democrats (81%) are significantly more likely than Republicans (36%) to agree we're facing a climate change emergency, while half of Republicans (48%) disagree, compared with only 6% of Democrats
