Life in Sydney 2020

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Background

Ipsos Public Affairs and the Committee for Sydney started the 'Life in Sydney' study in 2020.

It provides a snapshot of the Greater Sydney community sentiment on a range of issues, more specifically:

- Quality of life
- Travel and transport
- Impact of COVID-19
- Climate change and global warming

The survey aims to be conducted every year to track sentiment overtime. The information gathered helps to inform the Committee for Sydney's research and advocacy work and is a useful resource for decision makers in government.

QUALITY OF LIFE

We asked people to tell us what they like and dislike about living in Sydney.

Overall, those surveyed were positive about living in Sydney. Majority (85%) are very satisfied or fairly satisfied with their quality of life. Those tend to be retirees and older people.

People are also optimistic with a larger proportion (37%) believing that their quality of life will improve over the next 12 months.

Most popular aspects of living in Sydney include access to great facilities, a diverse range of activities and a beautiful natural environment.

A high cost of living and unaffordable housing are the biggest concerns and key drivers of dissatisfaction.

Around one in five (21%) of Sydneysiders are likely to move in the next few years. Those tend to be younger or to be working full time and are mainly driven by the high cost of living.





Quality of life Four in five (81%) Sydneysiders are satisfied with their quality of life

- Retirees and people aged 50 and over are more likely to be satisfied
- Facilities and services, the activities available and the beautiful scenery are key drivers of satisfaction

Drivers of quality of life

Great city, opera house, botanical gardens, plenty of walks to do, beaches are great, some are managed with life savers, lovely bush walks, blue mountains. Lots of shopping complexes to choose from. Quality of life overtime People tend to be optimistic about their quality of life with over one third (37%) who believe it will get better in 12 months time

Likelihood to move away from Sydney

Around one in five (21%) of Sydneysiders are likely to move in the next few years

- These people intending to move tend to be younger or to be working full time
- Conversely, retirees and people aged 50 and over are less likely to move







Reasons for leaving Sydney

High cost of living is the first reason prompting people to consider moving away from Sydney

Secondary drivers include seeking a better lifestyle and work life balance

COMMUNITY EXPERIENCE AND SENTIMENT TRAVELAND TRANSPORT

We aimed to find out what modes of transport Sydneysiders are using to commute to and from work or place of study and understand their experiences of the travel network.

Our results show that the majority of people are satisfied with their current commute, with less that 15% of respondents dissatisfied.

Although a similar proportion of commuters use cars and public transport, cars tend to be more prominent (55%) especially in Western Sydney. While public transport is more popular among younger age groups and those living in Eastern City.

The average commute time for those surveyed was almost 45 minutes per journey, although interestingly it is considerably higher for students.

Majority of people surveyed support building new cycling lanes in Sydney. Road safety is a key barrier with nearly half (46%) of Sydneysiders indicating they would cycle more if the roads were safer for cyclists.





Current commute Majority (69%) of Sydneysiders are satisfied with their current commute

- It takes on average around 45 minutes for people to get to/from work or place of study
- The proportion of car and public transport commuters is fairly similar

Current commute

The main drivers of satisfaction with commute relate to convenience Easy access, short and easy trip generate satisfaction







Conversely, long commute, congested traffic and unreliable transport drive dissatisfaction



COVID-19 impact on commute

Around half (53%) of commuters have been impacted by COVID-19

- The average travel time of impacted commuters tends to be slightly lower
- COVID-19 had very minimal to no impact on travel mode on those specifically impacted commuters

Cycling infrastructure

Nearly half (46%) of Sydneysiders would cycle more if the roads were safer

• This safety barrier is reinforced by a strong perception around roads in Sydney being unsafe for cyclists

IMPACT OF COVID-19

Like most cities around the world, Sydney has been significantly disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Life in Sydney shows that work habits have changed, with over half of respondents saying that they now work from home. Those tend to be university students and people in full-time employment, while people living in Western Sydney and in part-time employment are less likely to be working from home.

A majority of respondents rated the response to the pandemic by the NSW government as 'very' or 'fairly good'. People aged 50 and over were most likely to rate the government's response as positive.





Working from home

More than half (55%) of Sydneysiders workers have been working from home as a result of COVID-19

- Most of those people feel very positive about working from home in terms of time saving and other benefits (e.g. productivity, mental health)
- Nearly three quarters (73%) even prefer this setting

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COMMUNITY ATTITUDES CLINATE CHANGE AND GLOBAL WARNING



Six Americas Super Short Survey (SASSY) Sydneysiders tend to be concerned about global warming with a higher proportion qualifying as 'alarmed' (28%) and 'dismissive' (8%)
