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

Although most Britons remain satisfied with their life, levels of satisfaction have decreased since March this year


Q All things considered, how satisfied are you with your life as a whole nowadays? Where 0 means extremely dissatisfied and 10 means extremely satisfied.

Q Do you think the UK is moving in the right or wrong direction?





Britons remain positive about the impact of immigration with attitudes returning to similar levels seen in December 2018


Q On a scale of 0 to 10, has migration had a positive or negative impact on Britain? (0 is "very negative", 10 is "very positive")

Q On a scale of 0 to 10, has migration had a positive or negative impact on Britain? (0 is "very negative", 10 is "very positive")



Half want the number of immigrants coming to Britain to be reduced while four in ten want them to either stay the same or be increased


Q Do you think the number of immigrants coming to Britain nowadays should be increased a lot, increased a little, remain the same as it is, reduced a little, or reduced a lot?

But fewer want the numbers of immigrants coming to Britain to be reduced compared to all previous waves of this series reflecting a continuous downward trend




There has been a significant increase from March in the proportion of Britons who think that immigration has been discussed too little





Q How strongly would you support or oppose providing EU citizens with a physical card that would prove their right to live in the UK?




Refugees

Q How much sympathy if at all, if any, do you have for the migrants attempting to cross the English Channel by boat to come to Britain?





Q When thinking about how the UK processes people who arrive in Britain seeking asylum, which of the following two statements comes closest to your views?




While more Britons support rather than oppose sending asylum seekers offshore but close to Britain to be processed, half are opposed to closing borders to refugees completely

Technical note

- Ipsos MORI interviewed 2,532 adults aged 18+ across Great Britain online. Data are weighted to reflect the population profile.
- Fieldwork dates were 12th 29th November 2020
- The survey was conducted on behalf of IMIX, the migration communications hub with funding from Unbound Philanthropy and the Barrow Cadbury Trust.
- Percentage scores are shown out of 100%. Where figures do not add up to 100%, this is due to computer rounding. An asterisks indicates a score less than 0.5%, but greater than zero. Combined figures are based on the constituent parts (e.g. % agree = % strongly agree + % tend to agree). These figures are also subject to the effect of rounding.



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
