


### MALAYSIANS EXPECT ECONOMIC RECOVERY WILL TAKE TWO YEARS OR MORE


Q. When do you think the economy of [COUNTRY] will have recovered from the pandemic?


# HALF OF MALAYSIANS TRUST GOVERNMENT TO LEAD RECOVERY

U.S public is least likely to trust big business to lead the recovery. They trust consumers (individuals) to take the primary responsibility to recovery the country economy.

# FOR MALAYSIANS, NEW BUSINESSES, JOBS AND TOURISTS WILL BE SEEN AS SIGNS OF RECOVERY

#### EXPECTATIONS TOWARDS NATIONAL RECOVERY

As the pandemic has wrecked havoc on economies worldwide, a key question has been when a full recovery can be expected. Countries have experienced partial recoveries, only to be plunged into new periods of restrictions with severe impact on the local economy.

Malaysians are cautious when assessing when a full recovery can be expected – a significant majority believes it will take two years or more, which is largely in line with the global sentiment. There are some exceptions, most notably China, where a majority thinks the economy has already recovered.

Trust in government leading the recovery effort is strong – half of Malaysians believe in the government taking the leading role, compared to a third globally. Most Malaysians think new businesses, new job openings and the return of tourists will be clear indicators that a recovery is underway.
