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

The percentage of Australians who selected the item as one of their top five attributes that makes somewhere a good place to live.


Performance

The most and least liveable areas across regional Australia

The most and least liveable areas are drawn from the Regional Australia Liveability Index – a measure of regional Australia's liveability between 0 and 100. The Index is created by multiplying each attribute's importance by how well Australians rate its performance in their local area. The map shows the Liveability Index for each regional area.



About Life in Australia 2021

The Understanding liveability across regional Australia report is drawn from the Ipsos Life in Australia project — the nation's largest annual study of community values and liveability. Life in Australia is a citizen-centric approach to understanding liveability. In August 2021, we asked 10,939 Australians to select the top five attributes that they believe makes somewhere a good place to live. We also asked them to rate how well their local area performed on a scale between 0 and 10 across 16 liveability attributes. The ranking of the Regional Australia's most liveable areas are shown on the next pages.

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
