

# One in four feel they have nothing in common with Democrats or Republicans

New Ipsos polling finds that few people are confident that Americans will reconcile their differences in the next five years.

Washington, DC, April 22, 2022 – A new Ipsos poll finds that few Americans feel they have anything in common with people of different races or party affiliations. This sentiment has largely held constant since tracking began in December of last year. At the same time, many people have had a meal in the past year with people of different races or party affiliations, something that has also remained stable over the past four months. While that is true, there are significant difference by race when the data is cut further. Taken together, few are confident that Americans will come together in the next five years and resolve their differences.

#### **Detailed Findings:**

Few feel they have anything in common with people of different races or party affiliations.

 One in four people feel they have nothing in common with Republicans (24%) and Democrats (24%).

While a majority of Americans have had a meal within the past year with people of different races and party affiliations, there are significant differences by race when cutting the data further.

- Three quarters (75%) of Americans report having a meal with a white person in the last six months, under half report having a meal with either a Black (44%) or Hispanic (40%) over the same period.
- Likewise, only half of Americans (51%) report having a meal with a Democrat and just under half (48%) shared a meal with a Republican over the last six months.
- Notably, about one in three people had a meal more than a year ago or have never had a meal with a Black or Hispanic person.
- Only one in ten Americans have had a meal more than a year ago or have never had a meal with a white person. The larger share of white Americans in the sample, which is representative of the U.S. population, largely drives this gap.

These are the findings of an Ipsos poll conducted between April 11-12, 2022. For this survey, a sample of 1,005 adults age 18+ from the continental U.S., Alaska, and Hawaii was interviewed online in English. The poll has a margin of error of plus or minus 3.8 percentage points for all respondents.

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#### **About the Study**

These are some of the findings of an Ipsos poll conducted between April 11-12, 2022. For this survey, a sample of 1,005 Americans age 18+ from the continental U.S., Alaska, and Hawaii were interviewed online in English. The sample includes 444 Democrats, 369 Republicans, and 130 independents. Weighting was then employed to balance demographics to ensure that the sample's composition reflects that of the adult population according to Census data and to provide results intended to approximate the sample universe. The precision of Ipsos online polls is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the poll is accurate to within ± 3.8 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, had all Americans been polled. The credibility interval will be wider among subsets of the population. All sample surveys and polls may be subject to other sources of error, including but not limited to coverage error and measurement error. The poll also has a credibility interval of ± 5.7 percentage points for Democrats, ± 6.2 percentage points for Republicans, and  $\pm$  10.5 percentage points for independents.

These questions were trended with findings from Ipsos polling conducted between March 14-15, 2022, February 14-15, 2022, and December 13-17, 2021. A sample of 1,005 Americans were interviewed online in English for the March and February waves, while a sample of 4,407 Americans were interviewed for the December survey. All interviews were conducted online in English among Americans age 18+ from the continental U.S., Alaska, and Hawaii. The credibility intervals are ± 3.8 percentage points for the March and February waves, while the credibility interval for the December wave is ± 1.7 percentage points.
