


Half of Britons say they are following news about local elections, as they are paying more attention to the rising of cost living and Ukraine


How closely, if at all, have you been following stories about...?

How closely, if at all, have you been following stories about...? Local elections taking place on Thursday 5th May








Labour voters would be more likely than Conservatives to focus on how well the UK Government has performed and what they think of national leaders when deciding how to vote


2019 Conservative voters 2019 Labour voters







There is little variation in top issues for age groups, with all prioritising the cost of living followed by the NHS

Top five issues selected by each age group








The Labour party are perceived to perform slightly better in local government than other parties, but large proportions say they don't know / none of the parties
