
Public perceptions of local policing and the police

Thinking now about the police in your local area, which of these phrases best describes the way you would speak about them to other people?




Public view local police as most effective at protecting those at greatest risk of harm (36%), but least effective at protecting those online (18%)

In the past 12 months how effective, if at all, do you think the police in your local area have been at each of the following? % Effective

People view local police as most effective at protecting those at greatest risk of harm (36%), tackling anti-social behaviour (36%), and reducing crime (36%).

The public feels local police are least effective in protecting people online (18%) and tackling internal cultural issues (23%).

3 in 10 (29%) think local police are not effective at preventing violence against women





Around half of the public think that local police officers are trustworthy, honest, competent and fair - opinions have improved since 2021






Ethnic minorities are more likely to think police officers are racist and sexist compared to White people

Here is a list of characteristics that a police officer may have. Thinking about the police in your area, please indicate whether you think that, on the whole, they are or are not...?

Three in ten (32%) ethnic minorities think that police officers are racist, compared with just 11% of White people.

White people hold more positive views of police officers; half or more think they are trustworthy, honest, fair in how they treat people, and competent. This is lower among ethnic minority respondents.

The majority (59%) of Britons are confident they would be treated fairly by the police, but just one third (34%) think the police treat all people with respect




Ethnic minorities have less confidence and trust in the police compared to White people – just 37% think they will be treated fairly if they come in contact with a police officer

Just 37% ethnic minorities are confident that they will be treated fairly if they come into contact with a police officer compared to 62% of White people.


White people hold more positive views of police officers; around half or more think that they will be treated fairly, can be trusted to do the right thing, act with integrity and take violence against women and girls seriously


Women are less likely to think the police take violence against women and girls seriously in Britain compared to men

Britons are most likely to think the police should prioritise rape and sexual offences and violent crime


Which three of the following types of crime/anti-social behaviour do you think police across Britain should prioritise?

Which three of the following types of crime/anti-social behaviour do you think police across Britain should prioritise?




Four in 5 (81%) think drug use is a serious problem in Britain. Older age groups are more likely think this than younger age groups.





Almost half (45%) of Britons say they know someone who has taken drugs


Do you personally know anyone who has taken drugs at least once in the past 12 months?
