


Public concern about the cost of living is high and increasing

To what extent, if at all, would you say you are concerned about the cost of living over the next six months for each of the following?






Common responses to the rise in cost of living are socialising less or shopping around for better deals but some are skipping meals and incurring more debt

I have not done this






In the next six months, which of the following, if any, do you expect to do as a result of the rising cost of living?








One in three say they have found it difficult to afford their energy bills in the past three months, lower income groups and those living with children particularly impacted

Overall, how easy or difficult would you say your household has found it to afford paying your energy bills in the past three months?








Many are regularly turning lights off or using less hot water to save money. Some are often skipping meals

% At least once a week








Many are shopping around to look for cheaper energy suppliers or installing smart meters but others are going into debt or using savings to pay their bills

I have thought about this but haven't




Which of the following policies, if any, do you think are the best ways to help people in Britain cope with the rising cost of living? Please select all that apply.
