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### **Technical note**

- Ipsos interviewed 3,004 adults aged 18+ across Great Britain online. Data are weighted to reflect the population profile.
- Fieldwork dates were 19 July to 3 August 2022.
- The survey was conducted in collaboration with British Future with funding from Unbound Philanthropy and the Barrow Cadbury Trust.
- Percentage scores are shown out of 100%. Where figures do not add up to 100%, this is due to computer rounding. An asterisks indicates a score less than 0.5%, but greater than zero. Combined figures are based on the constituent parts (e.g. % agree = % strongly agree + % tend to agree). These figures are also subject to the effect of rounding.




### Immigration



### Attitudes towards the impact of immigration remain unchanged with more Britons remaining positive than negative

Q On a scale of 0 to 10, has migration had a positive or negative impact on Britain? (0 is "very negative", 10 is "very



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**Overall**, just under half (46%) think migration has had a positive impact on the country, whilst three in ten (29%) disagree.

### Leave voters, however, have become slightly more negative since February.



Q Thinking about each of the following, do you think their views about the impact of immigration on Britain have become more positive or more negative over the last few years, or have their views stayed the same?





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## The proportion of people wanting to see immigration reduced is similar to February as is the proportion of those wanting to see it increased


Q Do you think the number of immigrants coming to Britain nowadays should be increased a lot, increased a little, remain the same as it is, reduced a little, or reduced a lot?


#### The longer term trends show the proportion of those wanting to see immigration reduced plateauing at 42%. Those wanting to see numbers increased has steadily increased since 2020.

## While more people think the number of EU migrants coming to Britain has reduced rather than increased, six in ten Britons believe the number of asylum seekers has increased.


Q For each of the following groups, do you think the number of immigrants coming to Britain nowadays has increased, reduced or is about the same over the last few years?

Those coming to seek refuge or asylum in Britain






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There has been little shift in the proportion thinking that immigration has been discussed too little. However, since Feb 2015, the proportion thinking it has been discussed too much has almost halved.

Q Generally speaking, do you think that the issue of immigration has been discussed in Britain too much, too little or about the right amount over the last few months?







Q Overall, how satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the way the current government is dealing with immigration?







Q And for which of the following reasons, if any, make you dissatisfied with the way the current government is dealing with immigration?





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

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
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## Labour supporters and Remain voters are most likely to advocate an increase in number of migrant health workers coming to live in the UK



Q Would you prefer the number of migrants (from any country) from each of the below groups coming to live in the UK to be increased, reduced, or should it remain about the same?





### **Refugees and asylum**



We should ensure that asylum seekers who do not have a genuine need for protection are stopped from coming to Britain, even if it means some who do have a genuine need are also stopped from coming in






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### A majority continue to have sympathy for migrants attempting to cross the English Channel.

## More support than oppose the idea of the British government creating a welcoming programme for newly arrived migrants


Q How strongly would you support or oppose the British government creating a welcoming programme linking British people with newly arrived migrants to help them settle and integrate in Britain?

Q And how likely, if at all, would you personally be to take part in a welcoming programme?



More Britons support than oppose the government's Rwanda policy- with a majority from Conservative and Leave voters supporting the policy

Q The UK Government has recently introduced a policy in which some people who enter the UK to seek asylum, by coming across the Channel without prior permission, will be sent to Rwanda without the UK assessing their claim. Those sent to Rwanda can apply for asylum there through the Rwandan asylum system and will not be eligible to return to the UK. On balance, to what extent, if at all, do you support or oppose this policy?


A majority think the Rwanda policy is not likely to reduce the number of refugees trying to enter the UK without permission or discourage genuine refugees from applying for asylum while a majority also think the policy will not provide value for money.

Q To what extent would you support or oppose each of the following potential measures relating to asylum seekers in the UK?


