



Public concern about the cost of living remains high


Common responses to the rise in cost of living are not turning the heating, socialising less or swapping to cheaper supermarkets






Over the next six months, one in four of those who work expect to put in longer hours, and the same proportion of Brits overall expect to sell some personal belongings

Options with asterisks are not based on all, but * those currently working (1456) ** those currently not working (655) and *** those living with children aged 17 or under (713)








One in three say they have found it difficult to afford their energy bills in the past three months, with younger age groups, those living with children and lower income groups particularly impacted

Overall, how easy or difficult would you say your household has found it to afford paying your energy bills in the past three months?








Many are continuing to turn their lights and electrical goods off when not in use, with increasing numbers not turning their heating on when they usually would have


Three in ten have installed a smart meter or are shopping around for cheaper energy suppliers



Who would you trust to reduce the cost of living?


To what extent, if at all, would you trust each of the following to reduce the cost of living if they were Prime Minister? Would you trust them...?






One in three with a mortgage / paying rent say their payments have increased the last three months – younger age groups and those with a mortgage are more likely to have been impacted


In the last 3 months, have your rent or mortgage payments increased, decreased or stayed the same?








Three in four say Liz Truss' government did a bad job at managing the rising cost of living

Do you think that Liz Truss' government has done a good or bad job at managing the rising cost of living?









Two in five think that public spending on overseas aid has the most room to be reduced without significant negative impacts








Most think Martin Lewis will have a positive influence on the cost of living over the next six months, while views on British politicians are split
