

Ipsos Veracity Index 2022 Results topline

Technical Note

The Veracity Index is an annual poll that has measured the trustworthiness of professions in Britain since 1983. Typically, this poll is carried out using a face-to-face methodology but since 2020 it has been carried on a telephone survey instead. Given this change in methodology, caution should be used when comparing the new data points with previous years' data, especially when differences are only at the margin of error.

This year's survey was carried out over two waves of a telephone omnibus survey.

- For a short list of nine professions (lawyers, engineers, advertising executives, care home workers, museum curators, landlords of private residential properties, car mechanics, taxi drivers and serving staff at restaurants), Ipsos interviewed a representative sample of 1,005 adults aged 16+ across Great Britain by telephone between 19 and 26 October 2022.
- For the core list of 21 professions Ipsos interviewed a representative sample of 1,004 adults aged 16+ across Great Britain by telephone between 26 October and 1 November 2022.

Data are weighted to the population profile. Where percentages do not sum to 100 this may be due to computer rounding.
