

How closely, if at all, have you been following stories about...?





How important, if at all, do you think it is to have trade unions to protect workers' interests?








Support among Britons for the upcoming rail strikes is largely divided

From what you know, or have heard, to what extent, if at all, do you support or oppose these strikes?





The planned strikes mean that many rail services are unlikely to run on strike days. The railway unions are protesting against job cuts, pay freezes and changes to railway workers' employment terms and conditions.

Based on what you know or have heard, to what extent, if at all, do you support or oppose these strikes?




Britons continue to sympathise with rail passengers and workers, while remaining less sympathetic towards train companies, Network Rail and the UK Government
