



Around half support the planned strike action by nurses – including more than twice the proportion of 2019 Labour voters compared to Conservative

As you may be aware, nurses at the majority of NHS employers across the UK are planning strike action. The strike action excludes certain types of care, such as emergency intervention to preserve life or prevent permanent disability. To what extent, if at all, do you support or oppose the planned strike action by nurses?









Around half support the planned strike action by ambulance workers, while nearly two in five oppose it

As you may be aware, ambulance workers at the majority of ambulance services in England and Wales are planning strike action. This includes paramedics, call handlers and emergency care assistants. Ambulances will still be dispatched to life-threatening calls. To what extent, if at all, do you support or oppose the planned strike action by ambulance workers?



Three quarters think the main reason for nurses taking strike action is for an increase in pay, followed by two in five who think this is for there to be more staff in the NHS

As far as you know, which two or three of the following are the main reasons that nurses are taking strike action?






The majority of Brits think it is acceptable for nurses to strike for better standards of care for patients and for an increase in pay


How acceptable or unacceptable is it, if at all, for nurses to strike for each of the following reasons?



Half think the level of pay rise the RCN are asking for is too high, with 2019 Conservative voters more likely to think this

The Royal College of Nursing, which represents the NHS nurses that will take strike action later this year, has asked for a 5% pay rise for NHS nurses on top of inflation - a total pay rise of 17%. In your view, to what extent is this pay rise they are asking for too high, too low, or about right?
