



How closely have you followed these news stories?





Do you think the UK government led by Rishi Sunak is doing a good job or bad job, if either, at negotiating with trade unions to prevent public sector workers going on strike?





Three in five parents are worried that that their child(ren) are receiving poor quality education because not enough money is spent on schools and teachers


Please rate, how much you are worried, or not, about...?
