About the Study

These are the findings of an NPR/Ipsos poll conducted September 5-11, 2023, by Ipsos using our KnowledgePanel®. This poll is based on a representative probability sample of 1,304 adults aged 18 or older. This sample includes 528 parents who are adults ages 18+ who have K-12 school-aged child(ren).

The survey was conducted using KnowledgePanel, the largest and most well-established online probability-based panel that is representative of the adult US population. Our recruitment process employs a scientifically developed addressed-based sampling methodology using the latest Delivery Sequence File of the USPS – a database with full coverage of all delivery points in the US. Households invited to join the panel are randomly selected from all available households in the U.S. Persons in the sampled households are invited to join and participate in the panel. Those selected who do not already have internet access are provided a tablet and internet connection at no cost to the panel member. Those who join the panel and who are selected to participate in a survey are sent a unique password-protected log-in used to complete surveys online. As a result of our recruitment and sampling methodologies, samples from KnowledgePanel cover all households regardless of their phone or internet status and findings can be reported with a margin of sampling error and projected to the general population.

The study was conducted in English. The data were weighted to adjust for gender by age, race/ethnicity, education, Census region, metropolitan status, household income, and parental status. The demographic benchmarks came from the 2022 March Supplement of the Current Population Survey (CPS). Additionally, the indicator for parents of K-12 school-aged children was derived from the weighted main sample.

The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 3.2 percentage points at the 95% confidence level, for results based on the entire sample of adults. The margin of sampling error takes into account the design effect, which was 1.36. The margin of sampling error is higher and varies for results based on subsamples. The margin of sampling error for parents of K-12 school-aged children is plus or minus 4.9 percentage points at the 95% confidence level, with a design effect of 1.33. The margin of sampling error is higher and varies for results based on sub-samples. In our reporting of the findings, percentage points are rounded off to the nearest whole number. As a result, percentages in a given table column may total slightly higher or lower than 100%. In questions that permit multiple responses, columns may total substantially more than 100%, depending on the number of different responses offered by each respondent.

This topline includes trended data from two previous NPR/Ipsos polls. The first poll was conducted from February 27-28, 2018, and it included a non-probability opt-in sample of 1,005 adults ages 18+. The

second poll was conducted from June 10-12, 2022, and it included a representative probability sample of 1,028 adults ages 18+. In the February 2018 poll, the credibility interval is plus or minus 3.5 percentage points for all respondents. In the June 2022 poll, the margin of sampling error is plus or minus 3.3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level for all respondents.
