


Perceptions of the British economy: Trend






Almost three in five who think the economy is in a poor state blame the impact of Covid-19, followed by Brexit, Truss and other Conservative governments

Please pick as many as apply.









Labour's lead over the Conservatives as the party most trusted to manage Britain's economy has doubled since March 2023


Which party, if either, do you trust most to manage Britain's economy?





Around two in five think Labour and the Conservatives would increase taxes if they were to win the next General Election. However, more than twice as many think Labour would increase spending on public services than the Conservatives.


And imagine the Labour Party / Conservative Party were to win the next General Election. To what extent, do you think they would increase, decrease, or keep each of the following at the same level?





2019 Conservative voters say they would prefer taxes to be cut for individuals in the next budget, while 2019 Labour voters say they would prefer increased spending in public services

As you may know, Chancellor Jeremy Hunt will be announcing the next budget on Wednesday 6th March. Imagine the Chancellor had the choice between cutting taxes for individuals, meaning you personally pay less tax even if it means spending less on public services, or spending more money on public services, even if it means you personally paying more in taxes. Which of the following would you prefer?

Three in five think tourists from outside the EU should have to pay VAT on goods they are buying when visiting the UK, only one in five think otherwise.


Do you think that tourists from outside the EU, should or should not have to pay VAT on goods they are buying when they are visiting the UK?


