


Britons continue to be most likely to say care workers are paid too little relative to other groups of healthcare workers – and fewer now say resident (junior) doctors are paid too little




Two in five think that nurses were right to reject an offer of a 5.5% pay rise

As you may know, at the end of July, the government extended an average pay rise offer of 5.5% for the 2024-2025 financial year to nurses within the NHS. Earlier this week, it was announced that nurses within the England Royal College of Nurses have voted to reject this offer for being unfair.




Two in five think the pay rises offered to nurses and resident doctors provide good value for money

In addition to the pay rise offered to nurses, resident doctors (formerly known as junior doctors) were also offered an average pay rise of 8% for 2024-2025. As a reminder, nurses were offered an average pay rise of 5.5% for the 2024-2025 financial year.






The public are split on whether they support or oppose nurses going on strike if the government does not offer them a higher pay rise in the future






Almost half think the previous Conservative government is most to blame for the industrial dispute with nurses lasting this long






The public are more likely to think the UK government led by Keir Starmer is doing a bad job than a good job at negotiating with trade unions






Around a third think that the current government is doing a better job at negotiating with trade unions than the previous government – another third have seen no difference
