



Over the past year, have any of the following things happened to you?






7 in 10 support the British Government passing a law that gave British workers "the Right to Switch Off"









Half of Britons think it would be difficult for the British government to ensure organisations followed the Right to Switch Off

How easy or difficult, if either, do you think it would be for the British government to ensure organisations are following the terms of the Right to Switch Off?








Britons are more likely to think their coworkers, immediate managers / leaders, and senior leaders would respect the right to switch off than unlikely, should it be passed into law

If passed into law, how likely or unlikely, if either, do you think it is that the Right to Switch Off would be respected by each of the following?









2 in 5 Britons think it would have no impact on their career prospects if they were to assert their right to switch off and didn't reply to work communications after hours.








Over half of those who are in employment think that their mental health would get better if the Right to Switch Off was implemented

If the government were to adopt the Right to Switch Off, do you think each of the following would get better or worse, or do you think it would stay the same?



3 in 5 adults in employment agree that where they work, people have enough opportunities to share or receive feedback


To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements?

How often do you usually work at your employer's location (office, contact centre, etc.)?







If they were asked to return to the office five days a week, around 3 in 5 British workers say it is likely that they would seek an employer who did not require them to be in for this amount of time








Two in five say they go into the office all/most of the time
