


Over two in five British adults aged 18-50 have planned to delay/decided against having a child or more children again in the future

Thinking about the future, have you planned to delay, or have you decided against having another/a child(ren) in the future, or not?





Base: 569 British adults aged 18-50 who have planned to delay/decided against having children, 27 - 30 June 2025






Half of British adults think the total fertility rate in the UK today is lower than it was 15 years ago

Do you think the total fertility rate in the UK today is higher, lower or about the same as it was 15 years ago?



On balance do you think a higher/lower fertility rate (TFR) in the UK is a good or bad thing for the UK?






More than six in ten British Adults think it is difficult to be a parent in the UK today. Men are twice as likely as women to think it is easy






More than half of British adults think it is more difficult to be a parent in the UK today, than it was 20 years ago






Two in five British adults think that more affordable homes/housing would be most likely to lead to people in the UK having more children

In your opinion, which of the following, if any, would most likely lead to people in the UK having more children? Please choose all that apply.


