Ipsos' What Worries the World survey tracks public opinion on the most important social and political issues across 30 countries today, drawing on over ten years of data to place the latest scores in context.

Summary

01. French pessimism hits new low

The proportion of French people saying the country is "heading in the right direction" has reached a ten-year low of just 9%. Similarly, the number believing the economy to be "good" is at 10% - putting the nation at the bottom of our 30-country table for both indicators.

France has had a year of political instability after the National Assembly dissolved in June 2024. Mathieu Gallard, Account Director at our Public Affairs team in France, provides context to the data in our spotlight on France.

02. Financial/political corruption worry on the rise

Across 30 countries, the proportion expressing concern about corruption has risen slightly over the month to 28%. It's the fourth biggest concern overall.

Corruption worry is on the rise in APAC, with Malaysia's concern levels jumping eight points to 59%, and Thailand's score increasing seven points to just over half (51%). Meanwhile, Indonesia's level of worry is up four points to 72%, which is the highest it has been since we added the nation in August 2022.

Furthermore, after a recent <u>scandal involving</u> <u>President Milei's sister</u>, we see Argentina's corruption concern jump 11 points to 36%, the highest since September 2022.

03. Concern about tax reaching all corners

Across 30 countries, the proportion expressing concern about taxes remains at a fifth (19%), which is slightly higher than this time last year.

In addition to their economic pessimism, France is also concerned about taxes, with the level rising slightly to 28%.

After <u>recent unrest</u>, Indonesia's score has also reached a record high of 35% after jumping 12 points.

Additionally, Americans' levels of worry about taxation have increased five points, with a fifth (21%) now saying they're worried, which is the highest it has been in eight years.











Across 30 countries, the proportion saying their country is "heading in the right direction" remains at 37%. This is three points lower than this time last year.

France has reached a record low for optimism this month. The proportion of French people believing the nation is on the right track continues to fall and now stands at 9%. This is the lowest French score we've recorded on this measure in ten years.

Across the Channel, pessimism is also on the rise in Great Britain after the nation's right direction score fell five points over the month to three in ten (30%). This is ten points lower than last September's score.

Elsewhere, in Malaysia, optimism levels have also taken a sharp decline, down 11 points: today, three-fifths (61%) say the country is "heading in the right direction".













The famous caricature of the French is that they see the glass as half empty. But are some stereotypes true? According to our data, it would seem that the French are living up to convention.

This month, the proportion of French people believing their country is "heading in the right direction" reached a ten-year low of 9% - putting them bottom of our list of 30 countries.

Similarly, last month, they recorded a new low for economic sentiment, this time

with just 9% saying the economy is "good", which is the lowest since February 2016 (also 9%).

Mathieu Gallard, Account Director, Public Affairs in France, explains:

"French pessimism has grown sharply since the snap parliamentary elections in the summer of 2024 and the political turmoil that followed, which saw three different governments come and go in quick succession.

"Today, only 9% of French citizens believe the country is on the right track – down from 26% in June 2024, just before the National Assembly was dissolved. The contrast with southern European neighbours like Italy (30%) and Spain (31%) is now stark.

"Security tops the list of French concerns (36%), but economic and social issues are never far behind: inflation (30%), taxation (28%), poverty and inequality (27%), and the health system (26%). Anxiety in all these areas

is widespread, fuelled by the precarious state of public finances, which many fear will bring either higher taxes or cuts in social programs. Against this backdrop, only 10% say the country's economy is doing well – a dramatic drop of 20 points in just one year. France's economic fundamentals may not be worse than those of its neighbours, but the national mood has rarely been so bleak."







Health care as an issue across 30 countries is ranked sixth out of 18 concerns, with around a quarter, on average, mentioning it (23%).

Hungary has been the most consistently worried nation lately, with a majority (63%) currently saying health care is a primary issue. It has been their number one concern for two years now.

Six out of the top ten most worried countries are European, with Poland (41%), Ireland (38%), and Great Britain and Italy (both on 34%) all

featuring.

Overall, the level of worry about health care has, more or less, remained around this level post-pandemic.

However, thanks to recent data from the Ipsos Health Service Report (which comes out in October), we can see a 'Covid legacy' on specific health issues. In 2018, the perceived number one health challenge was cancer (52%). But in 2020, we started to see a rise in concern for mental health.

Spotlight: Health care

Over a five-year period, we've witnessed mentions of mental health rising from 26% in 2020 to 45% in 2025.

We also see a growing pessimism in people's expectations when it comes to the quality of health care in their country. In 2018, across 30 countries, 34% believed quality would improve. In 2025, that figure is 28%, with 21% now believing it will get worse.

When asked what are the biggest health problems facing their country, 47% across the

countries surveyed said access to treatment/long waiting times was the number one challenge, followed by not enough staff (43%), and cost of accessing treatment (33%).





Across 30 countries, the proportion mentioning crime & violence remains at 32%, while concern for inflation holds at 30%.

The only movement in the top five worries has been from financial/political corruption, where the number of mentions has risen slightly to 28%.

Concern seems to be rising in APAC, with the level of worry increasing in Indonesia,

Malaysia and Thailand.

Indonesia has also seen a significant uptick in worry about

taxes, after recent political turmoil. Likewise, the US and Great Britain have experienced rises in tax worry, albeit, not as significantly. 28%



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

Across 30 countries, the proportion expressing concern about crime & violence remains at a third (32%), with seven countries having it as their primary worry.

All but one LATAM country puts crime top, with Colombia reaching new highs in concern. The proportion of Colombians saying they are worried is up seven points from last month to 49%, which is 12 points higher than last September and the highest it has been since they were added to the study in

March 2021.

The Netherlands (33%) have also reached a four-year high after increasing by nine points, which is the highest since August 2021 (when it was 37%).



The proportion mentioning inflation across 30 countries remains at three in ten (30%).

Australia's concern levels about rising prices have been steadily decreasing over the past few months, with this September's score being the lowest for the nation since June 2022. Down three points from last month to just under two-fifths (39%) mentioning it, which is nine points lower than last year.

The US has experienced a slight uptick in concern of four points to just over two-fifths (42%)

saying they are worried. However, this is six points lower than a year ago.



The proportion mentioning poverty & social inequality across 30 countries remains at 29%, which marks no change from last month or indeed from 12 months ago.

The Dutch have displayed a sharp fall in concern about inequality since last month after the proportion expressing worry dropped eight points to 23%. Not only is this 13 points lower than last September, but it is also the lowest level since December 2021, when it was 20%.

On the flip side, Malaysia has experienced a seven-point rise to a third (32%), which the highest since April 2024 (when it was 32%).





The proportion mentioning unemployment across 30 countries remains unchanged from last month at 28%.

Singapore's level of worry has hit a record of 56% after increasing four points from last month, which is the highest it has been since the country was first included in the survey, in November 2022.

Conversely, worry has fallen to 34% in Colombia, after falling six points. This is the lowest score we've seen for the nation since they were added in March

2021.

The proportion of Swedes expressing worry jumped seven points to 31%, which is the highest it has been since August 2020.



6. Health Care

Across 30 countries the proportion saying health care is an issue facing their country is down slightly to 23%.

Last month, the proportion of Brits saying they're worried about health hit a record low of 33% - a score which we hadn't seen since September 2022 (also 33%). This month, concern risen marginally to 34%, avoiding a new record low.

Poland's level of concern has also increased slightly to just over two-fifths (41%), which is 12 points higher than it was this time last year.



After <u>recent unrest</u>, Indonesia's score has also reached a record high of 35% after jumping 12

points in a month. This is the highest it has been since they were added in August 2022.

Additionally, the US has increased five points to a fifth (21%) saying they're worried, which is the highest it has been in eight years.



The proportion mentioning immigration control across 30 countries remains at 18% this month.

In Japan, the level of concern about immigration control has risen four points this month to a quarter (24%). Not only is this ten points higher than last year, but the highest it has been in ten years.

Similarly, the number of Canadians expressing worry this month rose four points to 28%, which is four points higher than last year. The French have also seen a slight increase of three points to 27%, making it six points higher than 12 months ago.



The proportion of Japanese people concerned about climate change has increased marginally this month to a third (33%), now making it their primary worry. This is, however, the same level as this time last year.

South Korea's score has cooled off since last month's record

ten year high of 29%. This month, it is down four points to a quarter (25%).





The State of the Economy in my Country

Running alongside our **What Worries** the World survey, Ipsos' monthly Global **Consumer Confidence** study asks the public in 30 countries questions relating to the economy and finance, on a country and personal level.

The following section draws on some of this data to provide extra context to this month's What Worries the World report. It shows how the public rate the current economic climate in their country.

Across the 30 countries included in our survey, Indonesia has recorded the largest 12-month decrease in the proportion of people describing its country's economy as "good". Indonesia's good economy score has fallen 25 points from September 2024, down from 53% to 28%, its new all-time lowest score.

Elsewhere, France (-20pp), Germany (-14pp), Mexico (-12pp) and the Netherlands (-10pp) also record double-digit drops from this time last year.

Meanwhile, South Korea's good

economy score is up 14 points since September 2024, the country's highest score since May 2018 (33%). Argentina also sees a double-digit increase, up ten points from this point last year.







Methodology

This 30-country Global Advisor survey was conducted between August 22nd 2025 and September 5th 2025 via the Ipsos Online Panel system among 500 adults aged 18-74 in Canada, Israel, Malaysia, South Africa, Türkiye and the United States, 20-74 in Indonesia and Thailand, 21-74 in Singapore, and 16-74 in all other nations.

The "Global Country Average" reflects the average result for all the countries where the survey was conducted. It has not been adjusted to the population size of each country and is not intended to suggest a total result."

The sample consists of approximately 1000+ individuals in each of Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Ireland, Japan, Spain, Sweden, and the US, and approximately 500+ individuals in each of Argentina, Chile, Colombia, Hungary, Indonesia, Israel, Malaysia, Mexico, the Netherlands, Peru, Poland, Singapore, South Africa, South Korea, Thailand and Türkiye.

The sample in India consists of approximately 2,200 individuals, of whom approximately 1,800 were interviewed faceto-face and 400 were interviewed online.

The samples in Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, Great Britain, Hungary, Italy, Japan, the Netherlands, Poland, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, and the US can be taken as representative of these countries' general adult population under the age of 75.

The samples in Brazil, Chile, Colombia, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Mexico, Peru, Singapore, South Africa, Thailand and Türkiye are more urban, more educated, and/or more affluent than the general population. The survey results for these markets should be viewed as reflecting the views of the more "connected" segment of these populations.

India's sample represents a large subset of its urban population — social economic

classes A, B and C in metros and tier 1-3 town classes across all four zones.

Weighting has been employed to balance demographics and ensure that the sample's composition reflects that of the adult population according to the most recent census data.

The precision of Ipsos online polls are calculated using a credibility interval with a poll of 1,000 accurate to +/- 3.5 percentage points and of 500 accurate to +/- 5.0 percentage points. For more information on the Ipsos use of credibility intervals, please visit the Ipsos website.
