



## Confidence in government's economic policies has fallen...


Do you agree or disagree... "In the long term, this government's policies will improve the state of Britain's economy"





There is a real need to cut spending on public services in order to pay off the very high national debt we now have



Government borrowing is now at record levels, and will need to be reduced in future. Which of these statements comes closest to your own view?




### Fewer now support extending services


# If cuts have to happen – where should they take place?

And which TWO or THREE, if any, of the following main areas of public spending do you think **should be cut** to restore public finances?





## **Expectations of the NHS**


Thinking about the NHS over the next few years do you expect it to get better/worse?
