

"And do you **support** or **oppose** the implementation of the National Energy Policy?"





(percent who say "very/somewhat important")



"Please tell me whether you strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, or strongly disagree with each of the following statements."








Reasons for Passing Energy Policy Bill
