# Ipsos/McClatchy Poll PROJECT #81-5861-99

NOTE: all results shown are percentages unless otherwise labeled.

These are some of the findings of an Ipsos poll conducted September 18-22, 2008. For the survey, a nationally representative, randomly selected sample of exactly 1,068 adults across the United States was interviewed by Ipsos. With a sample of this size, the results are considered accurate within  $\pm 3.0$  percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult population in the U.S. been polled. Within this sample, Ipsos interviewed 923 respondents who self identified as registered voters. With a sample of this size, the results are considered accurate within  $\pm 3.2$  percentage points. The margin of error will be larger within regions and for other sub-groupings of the survey population.
