Political Polling in Pennsylvania: Wave 2 Research undertaken for Reuters

These are findings from an Ipsos poll conducted October 22-24, 2010 on behalf of Reuters. For the survey, a representative, randomly selected sample of exactly 600 adults aged 18 and older across Pennsylvania who are registered voters was interviewed by Ipsos. With a sample of this size, the results are considered accurate within 4.0 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire population of registered voters in Pennsylvania been polled. Likely voters (reported on for ballot questions only) are defined as individuals currently registered to vote, who voted in the 2008 Presidential election, are a 7-10 on a 10-point likelihood to vote scale, and are interested in following news about the campaign 'a great deal' or 'quite a bit.' Individuals who did not vote in the 2008 Presidential election qualify as likely voters if they are registered to vote, are an 8-10 on a 10-point likelihood to vote scale, and are interested in following news about the campaign 'a great deal' or 'quite a bit.' Out of our sample of 600 registered voters, 400 are likely voters. With a sample of this size, the results are considered accurate within ±4.9 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult population in the U.S. been polled.

All sample surveys and polls may be subject to other sources of error, including, but not limited to coverage error, and measurement error. These data were weighted to ensure that the sample's composition reflects that of the actual Pennsylvania registered voter population according to U.S. Census figures. Respondents had the option to be interviewed in English or Spanish. Figures filtered on Democrats, Republicans, and Independents are based on registered voters and not likely voters. Figures marked by an asterisk (*) indicate a percentage value of greater than zero but less than one half of a per cent. Where figures do not sum to 100, this is due to the effects of rounding. Data based on Independents should be treated as indicative only due to the small base size. Where trend data (italicized) is present, it is taken from the last Reuters poll in Pennsylvania carried out by Ipsos, for which the fieldwork period was August 27-29, 2010.
