Perceptions of International Trade May 6, 2015 Alliance for American Manufacturing

Methodology:

These are findings from an Ipsos poll conducted May 1 to 6, 2015. For the survey, a sample of 1,687 registered voters age 18 and over was interviewed online. The precision of Ipsos online polls is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the poll has a credibility interval of plus or minus 3.5 percentage points for all respondents.

The data were weighted to the U.S. current population data by gender, age, region and household income based on Census data. Statistical margins of error are not applicable to online polls. All sample surveys and polls may be subject to other sources of error, including, but not limited to coverage error and measurement error. Where figures do not sum to 100, this is due to the effects of rounding.
