

Ipsos Poll on Greek Referendum 2015

Published 3rd July 2015

These are findings from an Ipsos poll conducted from June 30^{th} – July 3^{rd} , 2015. For the survey, a sample of 1,001 Greeks age 18+ were interviewed by landline and mobile telephone. The margin of error on the poll is +/- 3.1%.

The sample is collected to be representative of Greek population in terms of age, gender and region. Data is weighted to reflect the results of the Jan 2015 Parliamentary election. Figures marked by an asterisk (*) indicate a percentage value of greater than zero but less than one half of one per cent. Where figures do not sum to 100, this is due to the effects of rounding.

CONTEXTUAL OVERVIEW

- A referendum has been called in Greece for July 5th, 2015
- As of July 2nd, Prime Minister Tsipras is advocating for a 'NO' vote, on the grounds that the offer is not good enough and that a 'NO' will give him more negotiating power with the EU
- The 'YES' campaign believes that failing to accept the offer will mean Grexit (Greek exiting Eurozone)
- The mood in Greece and the very limited access to bank funds (max E60/day withdrawn) means that the population, which supports Greece remaining in the Euro, is very nervous about Grexit
- Tsipras has a key speech planned for Saturday, July 4th, to address the people about the upcoming referendum;
- Polling over the past week suggests that while 'NO' had the initial momentum, 'YES' has catch up.
