



Do we care?




Only a minority of the public prioritize the environment as the most important national issue

What do you see as the most/other important issues facing Britain today?





Looking to the future, how do you think concern for the environment will develop over the next twenty years?





In your view, what are the three most important environmental issues facing your country today?




Brits are less likely to be concerned about de-forestation than other nations



Public views on woodlands

Data from Forestry Commission 2011 Survey



2 in 3 visit woodlands



Time, weather and access represent key barriers



Visitors see forests as places they can relax, have fun, keep fit and learn about the environment



Public feel forests / woodland have a role in terms of climate change

- On mitigation 82% agreed trees are good because they remove CO2
- On adaptation 73% agreed planting more trees can help us cope with climate change by providing shade and reducing effects of flooding






The public think government should provide them with information and support to live more sustainably

Strongly / tend to support (%)




Provide incentives to live more sustainably

Not get involved in whether or not people choose to live sustainably




Greater support for use of incentives and outright bans around pro-environmental behaviours than on Eating or Smoking
