## DECISION CANADA: THE FIRST POLL OF THE WINTER ELECTION CAMPAIGN

### A Snapshot Of The Political Landscape Taken In The Hours After The Government Falls Shows A Dead Heat And An Unpredictable Outcome

**Toronto, ON** – According to a new CanWest News Service/Global News survey conducted by Ipsos Reid throughout the hours following the fall of the government in Ottawa by a successful loss of confidence vote, the federal Liberals (31%, -3 points from a survey conducted November 22-24<sup>th</sup>, 2005) would be in a dead-heat tie with the Conservative Party (31%, +1 point) in terms of decided vote support if a federal election were held tomorrow. Meanwhile, 18% would vote NDP (+2), and 5% would vote for the Green Party (unchanged).

In Quebec, the Bloc Quebecois attracts 58% of the federal vote (-1 point) versus 24% support for the Liberals in this province (+1 point).

These are the findings of an Ipsos Reid poll conducted for CanWest News Service/Global News and fielded from November 28<sup>th</sup> to November 29<sup>th</sup> 2005. For the survey, a representative randomly selected sample of 1000 adult Canadians were interviewed by telephone. With a sample of this size, the aggregate results are considered accurate to within ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult Canadian population been polled. The margin of error will be larger within each sub-grouping of the survey population. These data were weighted to ensure the sample's regional and age/sex composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to the 2001 Census data.



#### Liberals (31%, -3 Points) Tied With Conservatives (31%, +1 Points)...

If a federal election were held tomorrow, 31% of decided voters would cast their ballot for the federal Liberals (-3 points from a November 24<sup>th</sup> poll), 31% would vote Conservative (+1 points), 18% would vote NDP (+2), and 5% would vote for the Green Party (unchanged).

In Quebec, the Bloc Quebecois is at 58% (-1 point) versus 24% support for the federal Liberals (+1 point).

Among all Canadians, 8% are undecided, refused to say whom they would vote for, or don't know.

#### Regional Highlights:

- The Liberals are down seven points in Ontario and are now essentially tied with the Conservatives in this province (37% vs. 35% for Conservatives).
- In Alberta, the Conservatives (64%, +11 points) have even more strongly asserted
  themselves and now hold the good majority of votes in this province (Liberals at 17%,
  -10 points).
