

IPSOS REID POLL ON ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIONS FINAL RESULTS – NOVEMBER 17, 2006

Methodology - Long Version

These are the findings of an Ipsos Reid poll conducted on behalf of the Vancouver Sun. The poll was fielded November 10^{th} to November 16^{th} , 2006 with a random sample of 300 adult British Columbians. With a sample of this size, the results are considered accurate to within ± 5.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult population of BC been polled. The margin of error will be larger within regions and for other sub-groupings of the survey population. These data were statistically weighted to ensure the sample's regional and age/sex composition reflects that of the actual BC population according to the 2001 Census data. The polling was conducted using Ipsos Reid's "Voice of the West InterActive Forum" – an online panel of more than 1,100 British Columbians who have randomly recruited to match the overall characteristics of the adult BC population.

Methodology – Short Version

These are the findings of an Ipsos Reid poll conducted on behalf of the Vancouver Sun. The survey was fielded November 10^{th} to November 16^{th} , 2006, with a random sample of 300 adult British Columbians. The survey has a margin of error of ± 5.6 percentage points, 19 times out of 20.

RESULTS

Self Assessment of Environmental Performance

Q1. How would you grade your own personal performance in preserving and protecting the environment?

Comments: On average, British Columbians give themselves a grade of "B-" for their personal environmental performance. With only one-in-ten (9%) residents self-assessing their performance as an "A", it's clear that most British Columbians recognize they could be doing more to preserve and protect the environment.

Self Assessment of Comparison to Others

Q2. Compared to other British Columbians, do you think you do more, less or about the same amount to preserve and protect the environment?

Comments: While British Columbians recognize they could be doing more to preserve and protect the environment, the vast majority (90%) of residents think they are doing more (47%) or at least as much (43%) as other individuals. Only 6% think they are doing less than other British Columbians.

General Activities Doing More Compared to Five Years Ago

Q3. Over the last five years, which of the following activities have you done MORE of, specifically to preserve and protect the environment?

Comments: British Columbians have a perception that they are doing more today than five years ago to preserve and protect the environment. Nine-in-ten say they are doing more recycling/composting. Eight-in-ten say they're conserving more energy at home. Six-in-ten say they're conserving more water at home and using less gasoline/creating fewer emissions. A significant minority even say they're eating in a more environmentally responsible manner than five years ago.

Specific Activities Being Done for Environment Today

Q4. Which of the following actions and activities have you taken specifically to preserve and protect the environment?

Comments: The table below shows the percentage of British Columbians who say they have taken certain actions specifically to preserve and protect the environment. These actions range from more than nine-in-ten (93%) recycling bottles and cans down to one-quarter (26%) who say they are taking transit instead of driving.

Willingness to Pay More for Gasoline

Q5. How much do you agree with the following statement? "I'm willing to pay more for gasoline in order to preserve and protect the environment."

Comments: Roughly half (48%) of British Columbians say they would be willing to pay more for gasoline in order to preserve and protect the environment.

Percentage Amount Willing to Pay More for Gasoline

Q6. [IF AGREE] How much more are you willing to pay for gasoline in order to preserve and protect the environment?

Comments: Among those willing to pay more for gasoline, about half (46%) say they would be willing to pay up to 10% more. Nearly one-quarter (23%) say they would be willing to pay 50% or 100% more.

Q7. How much do you agree with the following statement? "Every individual household should have a water meter, so that we all pay for what we consume."

Comments: Seven-in-ten (72%) British Columbians agree that every individual household should have a water meter, so that everyone pays for what we consume.

Views on Climate Change

Q8. How much do you agree with the following statement? "I am desperately concerned that if we don't take drastic action on climate change/global warming right now, the world may not last much longer than another couple of generations because of the damage that's being done."

Comments: Seven-in-ten (72%) British Columbians agree they are desperately concerned that if we don't take dramatic action on climate change, the world may not last much longer than another couple of generations. This is higher than a national figure of 63% recorded in Ipsos Reid polling in September, likely to due to increased media coverage of this issue in the last few weeks.
