INTO THE LIBERAL LEADERSHIP CONVENTION

A Two Part Ipsos Reid/CanWest Global Survey Report

Toronto, ON – Ipsos Reid, on behalf of CanWest/Global news, conducted a major 3 part study leading up to the pivotal Liberal Party leadership convention this weekend. The research included a four-week polling program which measured the electability of each of the potential Liberal leaders. In addition, the study includes a large-sample, rolling survey of current party support that spans the events of the last three weeks.



PART 1: WHICH LIBERAL LEADERSHIP CANDIDATE CAN BEAT HARPER? NONE OF THE ABOVE


Each of the potential federal Liberal Party leadership candidates, as of today, does not yet pose a threat to the Stephen Harper led Conservative government. In fact, it would appear that after a divisive and hard-fought leadership race that Liberal voters are as divided as the Liberal convention delegates themselves. The results suggest that the issue for Liberals is not who can defeat the Conservative government, but rather: who can put the Liberal Party back together again?







Ipsos Reid



These are the findings of an Ipsos Reid poll conducted for CanWest News Service/Global News and fielded from November 7th to November 29th, 2006. For this survey, a representative randomly selected sample of 4000 adult Canadians was interviewed by telephone. Each Liberal Party leadership candidate was tested among a sub-set of 1000 respondents to measure their current electability. With a sample of this size, each of the subsets results are considered accurate to within ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult Canadian population been polled. The margin of error will be larger within each of regional areas. These data were weighted to ensure the sample's regional and age/sex composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.

- Bob Rae is most popular in British Columbia and Saskatchewan/Manitoba (29%).
- Stephan Dion is most popular in Quebec (30%).
- Michael Ignatieff is most popular in Quebec (22%) and Atlantic Canada (18%).
- Gerrard Kennedy is most popular in Ontario (20%).

PART 2: QUIET ON THE FEDERAL FRONT

Despite Major Political Maneuvers On Parliament Hill, Party Support Remains Entrenched: Conservatives (37%, Unchanged); Liberals (31%, up 2 points); NDP (15%, down 4 points); Bloc Quebecois (44% within the Province of Quebec, up 6 points)

After a week which witnessed a series of high-stakes political maneuvers on Parliament Hill and more specifically saw the passing of a Conservative Party motion which defines the Quebecois as "a nation within a united Canada", a new Ipsos Reid survey reveals that the battle-lines within the Canadian electorate are stable as Conservative supporters and Liberal supporters remain largely entrenched.

Overall, the national poll fixes:

- The Conservative Party at 37% (unchanged from a October 31 to November 2nd, 2006 survey);
- The Liberal Party at 31% (up 2 points from 29%);
- The NDP at 15% (down 4 points from 19%);
- The Bloc Quebecois at 44% within the Province of Quebec (up 6 points from 38%) vs. 23% for Liberals and 19% for the Conservatives; and
- The Green Party at 5% (unchanged).

Eleven percent of Canadians are undecided, or would not vote.

Federal Government Approval

Currently, 53% of Canadians approve of the performance of the federal government under Stephen Harper (13% strongly approve) versus 45% who disapprove (22% strongly disapprove). The Conservative government has taken a sharp hit in approval rating in the Province of Quebec (-19 points from late July, 2006) and is also down in the province of Ontario (-9 points).

These are the findings of an Ipsos Reid poll conducted for CanWest News Service/Global News and fielded from November 14-29th, 2006. For this survey, a representative randomly selected sample of 3000 adult Canadians was interviewed by telephone. The most recent data conducted between November 28-29th is represented at a power of (n=1000), the data collected from November 21-23rd is represented at a power of 0.5 (n=500), and the data collected from November 14-16th at a power of 0.25 (n=250). With a sample of this size, the aggregate results are considered accurate to within ±3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, of what they would have been had the entire adult Canadian population been polled. The margin of error will be larger within each sub-grouping of the survey population. These data were weighted to ensure the sample's regional and age/sex composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data.
