12	LZ13. True or False: There is a system in hospitals that keeps track of people who have signed their organ donor card.
13	LZ14. True or False: Doctors won't do everything to save my life if they know I want to be an organ donor.
14	LZ15. True or False: Only deceased people who are on a ventilator at the time of death are eligible to donate their organs.
