1. As you may know, Omar Khadr is a Canadian citizen who was captured by U.S. troops after a firefight in Afghanistan and held in Guantanamo Bay for the last seven years. After maintaining his innocence since being captured, he has recently pleaded guilty to being a member of al-Qaeda, participated in acts of terrorism and murdered an American soldier as part of a plea bargain negotiated by both Canada and the United States that could allow him to serve some of his sentence in Canada. Some people say that Omar Khadr probably is not guilty and was forced into this plea bargain as his only option to be released someday after serving his sentence, and that the Canadian government should have been offering him more assistance prior to this point. Other people say that Omar Khadr probably is guilty and this plea bargain is too generous, and that the Canadian government was right not to have offered him any assistance up to this point.
