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One in Ten (12%) SBOs say they know another Business Owner who has Lost their Business due to Expenses from a Legal Dispute

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**Toronto, ON** – Three in ten (29%) small business owners in Canada say that they've had to deal with various types of legal disputes in the last three years, according to a new Ipsos poll conducted on behalf of DAS Canada. The most common type of disputes include collecting money owed by a customer (19%) or a contract dispute with a customer (13%), followed by a contract dispute with a supplier (9%), an employment dispute (7%), appealing a tax audit decision (7%), a customer, supplier or third party causes damage or trespasses or interferes with their business property (7%), appealing a regulatory or business license decision (6%), or a customer, supplier or third party causes bodily injury to one of their employees (5%).

Most (72%) small-business owners say that a legal dispute would have a tangible impact (46% large/26% moderate) on their business, while a minority says it wouldn't (14% no impact at all/13% not much). Despite recognizing the strain it could cause, just 12% of businesses have enough insurance to pay legal costs relating to being sued by employees, suppliers, customers, government regulatory or tax agencies, shareholders or other investors, or appealing a tax audit decision.

Perhaps most troubling is that one in ten (12%) business owners say they personally know another business owner who has lost their business due to lawyer's fees and related costs required to settle a legal dispute.

These are some of the findings of an Ipsos poll conducted between January 12<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup>, 2015 on behalf of DAS Canada. For this survey, a sample of 1,005 Canadian small-business owners from Ipsos' Canadian online panel was interviewed online. The precision of Ipsos online polls is measured using a credibility interval. In this case, the poll is accurate to within +/ - 3.5 percentage points, 19 times out of 20, had all small businesses with fewer than 100 employees been polled. The credibility interval will be wider among subsets of the population. All sample surveys and polls may be subject to other sources of error, including, but not limited to coverage error, and measurement error.

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
